# Local democracy and European citizenship

Is the European Union irremediably riddled with the mistrust of citizens and rise of Euroscepticism? Although quite common, this dire depiction is neither accurate, nor a fatality. And what if a reinvigoration of the European project could come from the local level? This seminar aims to discuss and brainstorm around this intuition that underlies the very purpose of the European College of Cluny. It will also give participants an update on the current challenges and perspectives of the European Union, with a focus on the question of legitimacy and democracy and an emphasis on possible interactions between local and European levels of governance. This seminar provides also an excellent opportunity to get an insight into the France's perspective on the European Union, eight months before the beginning of the French presidency of the EU Council
